ID clinicians can combine their clinical work with education and research by working in an academic setting, or they may work in community-based clinics or private practice.

Developing an Infectious Diseases Career in a Clinical Environment

Define your career goals

A career as an infectious diseases clinician provides a range of opportunities across a variety of environments, including:

- Academic tenure tracks as a clinical educator or researcher
- Academic non-tenure tracks as a full-time clinician
- Private practice (independent), group practice or community-based clinics
- Inpatient and/or outpatient settings
- Travel medicine
- Clinical positions in administration, safety, lab work and more
- · Clinical care focused on HIV, Hepatitis C, STIs and more

Consider these career factors

- Consider whether your primary interest is in general ID or whether you are willing to pursue other subspecialties.
- Evaluate the length of patient appointments and how much time will be spent on administrative tasks.
- Evaluate compensation models, restrictions on outside income and time/ funding allowance for future continuing education opportunities.
- Determine whether you'd like to work at one location or multiple.
- Look into teaching and research opportunities.
